<p>1. Purpose</p> <p>2. Authority</p> <p>3. Delegation of Responsibility</p>	<p>The Joint Operating Committee recognizes that each student’s mode of dress and grooming is a manifestation of personal style and individual preference.</p> <p>The Joint Operating Committee will not interfere with the right of students and their parents to make decisions regarding their appearance, except when their choices disrupt the educational program of the schools or affect the health and safety of others.</p> <p>The Joint Operating Committee has the authority to impose limitation on students’ dress in school.</p> <p>The Joint Operating Committee may require students to wear standard dress or uniforms.</p> <p>The Joint Operating Committee authorizes the CTC principal or designee to monitor student dress and grooming and enforce school rules prohibiting student dress or grooming practices which:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Present a hazard to the health or safety of the student or to others in the school. Materially interfere with school work, create disorder, or disrupt the educational program. Cause excessive wear or damage to school property.
