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Law Enforcement & Security Program Visit Reading City Police Department

The law enforcement students from Mrs. Mays' class had the wonderful opportunity to tour the Reading City Police Department. The students had the opportunity to visit the Video Safety Unit within the police department. The students saw the surveillance videos placed on the city blocks in action and learned how the videos assist police officers in combatting crime. The students also toured the property/evidence room, spoke to a K-9 handler and his K-9 officer, and toured the criminal investigations unit. Our tour guide, Sgt. Luz Shade provided the students the opportunity to sit in a working patrol car and allowed the students to use the lights and sirens on the patrol car. This field trip was a great opportunity for the law enforcement students to see how a police department functions on a daily basis and the roles and responsibilities of the officers and personnel in the department.



Hands-on Activity—Law Enforcement & Security

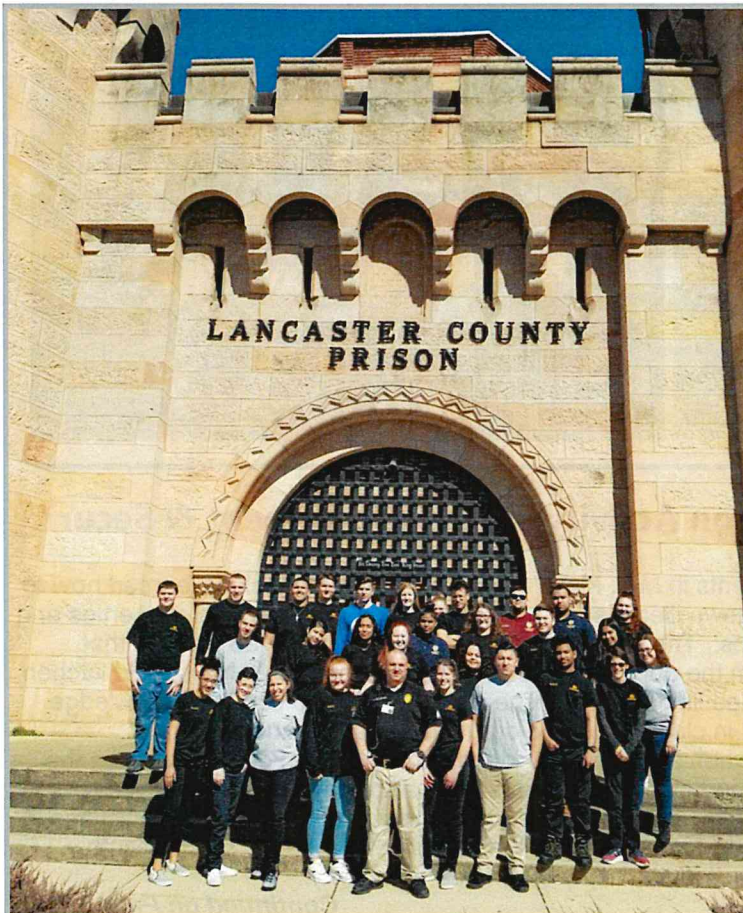
The students in Mrs. Mays' PM Law Enforcement class learned how to identify unknown illegal substances based on their physical properties and their reactions. The students participated in a "drug" lab in class that allowed them the opportunity to test substances from a household kitchen that resembled illegal drugs. The students were to use their knowledge they learned in class about the drugs they studied and apply that knowledge when attempting to identify the unknown drugs based on the physical properties. The students were also provided with three reactors that they were to add to each unknown "drug" and identify the reactions they witnessed to help identify the identity of the drug. The students seemed to thoroughly enjoy the hands-on activity.

Law Enforcement & Security Program Visits Lancaster County Prison



The Law Enforcement students in Mrs. Mays' classes visited the Lancaster County Prison last month. Sgt. Coleman provided the class with an informative tour of the prison. The students were provided an opportunity to see a K-9 demonstration. The K-9 found a cell phone it's handler hid inside a desk. Our tour guide, Sgt. Coleman also put on a bite sleeve to show the students how powerful and effective a K-9's bite can be when needed. The Lancaster County Prison has five K-9 handlers on staff. The students were given the opportunity to go into an active female block as well as the out mate block. They were able to see how the correctional officer in the control room handles the security within the facility.

Sgt. Coleman showed the students the kitchen and the laundry facilities and explained how the inmates work in both of those areas on a regular basis based on their behavior. The tour took us to the intake/commitment area of the prison where the students saw a non-compliant inmate, which was their favorite part. The correctional officers had to use less-lethal force on the inmate, OC spray and a Taser shield.

The students saw first hand the uses of force we discuss in class being used in the law enforcement field.

This field trip is always a great opportunity for the law enforcement students to get first hand knowledge and experience in the field of corrections.

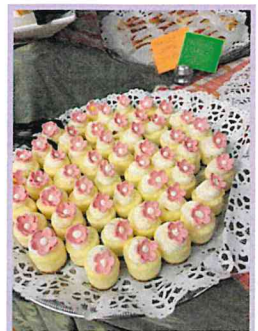

May 21st-30th 4pm-9:30pm

Only Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays

This course is designed to certify Licensed Practical Nurses in intravenous therapy and meet the goals of the Licensed Practical Nurse and to their role as a member of the health team. The course includes orientation, LPN Law, definitions, vascular devices, age-related considerations, legal implications, anatomy and physiology, fluid and electrolyte balance, infusion equipment, infection control, safety, insertion of peripheral catheters, steps to peripheral and central IV therapy, complications, central lines, documentation, and patient education.

Requirement: Current LPN/LVN unencumbered licensure with 1 year of clinical experience. Attending the IV Course along with passing written and tactile exam awarded IV Therapy course completion certificate.

30-hour course costs only \$275

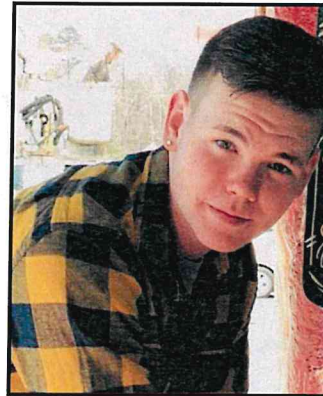
**Victoria Rhoads, LH
