
Students Excel At Welding Competition

Sethen Batz, CL placed 4th in the second year competition and won a pair of tig gloves.


Nikolas Harnish, EL won 1st place in the 1st year competition and received a Harris Torch setup.









Lebanon County Educational Honor Society Inducts Mike Schultz

LAW ENFORCEMENT—Pepper Spray

On April 18th Mrs. Mays' senior law enforcement students participated in the programs annual "OC Spray Day." In class the students became certified in basic OCAT. The students were given the opportunity to be exposed to Oleoresin Capsicum by receiving spray directly in their face, inhaling/smelling the Oleoresin Capsicum from a paper bag, or no exposure. Fifteen students opted to receive the direct exposure. The students soon realized pain after being exposed to OC, but all of them shared with me how happy they were that they chose to participate in "OC Spray Day." The students became OCAT certified by receiving 4 hours of classroom instruction. They took a written exam, performed tactical maneuvers, and optional OC exposure. Health Career students assisted during "OC Spray Day" by decontaminating the students who were sprayed. They cleaned the students faces, flushed their eyes with water, and used the water hose to provide relief of the burning sensation. Cosmetology students also assisted by washing the student's hair several times to eliminate possible reactivation later in the day and evening. Our school nurse, Mrs. Kreiser participated by offering her assistance to help decontaminate and ensure the students did not have allergic reactions or alarming side effects. The day was a success and a memorable event.



K-9 Fundraiser



Jr. Duck Stamp




Practical Nursing Program Visits Mutter Museum



COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT

Tree Planting Project—Landscape Technology

Students in the Landscaping Program at the Lebanon County Career and Technology Center (LCCTC) participated in a tree planting project at the Lebanon Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VA). The community service project resulted in the addition of approximately 200 trees to the VA campus landscape and was sponsored by representatives from the Lebanon Valley Conservancy as part of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation's Keystone 10 Million Trees Partnership. The collaborative goal is to unite national, regional, state, and local agencies, conservation groups, outdoor enthusiasts, and other volunteers to improve Pennsylvania's waterways and the health of the Chesapeake Bay.

Workers from the VA and Jon Schach, Master Arborist from Good's Tree Service, also joined the group of volunteers. "This was a special opportunity for our students to join forces with many other community members and further realize the benefits of teamwork and service to others," said Matthew Schwenk, LCCTC Assistant Director and member of the Leadership Lebanon Valley Class of 2019 which is run by the local Chamber of Commerce.

LCCTC Receives Grant from PA Commission on Crime and Delinquency

The Lebanon County Career and Technology Center (LCCTC) received notice of a grant award in the amount of \$60,000.00 from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), an organization which exists by statute to support increased safety and security initiatives for communities across the Commonwealth. Mr. Matthew Schwenk, LCCTC Assistant Director, wrote and submitted the successful application and the funds will be used to upgrade the school's entire security camera system during the 2019-20 school year.

"Ultimately, the camera equipment will support tangible security enhancements and improve the safety of our school community members which is a top priority for us," said Schwenk. Data sources indicate that LCCTC students, staff, and stakeholders experience many risk factors above the state average and the upgrades will complement ongoing efforts, funded locally, to address these challenges.

The PCCD award notice reported a very competitive grant process. A total of 638 applications were made requesting \$177.6 million. However, only 234 awards were made totaling \$40 million. The full listing of grants that were approved can be found on PCCD's website at:
